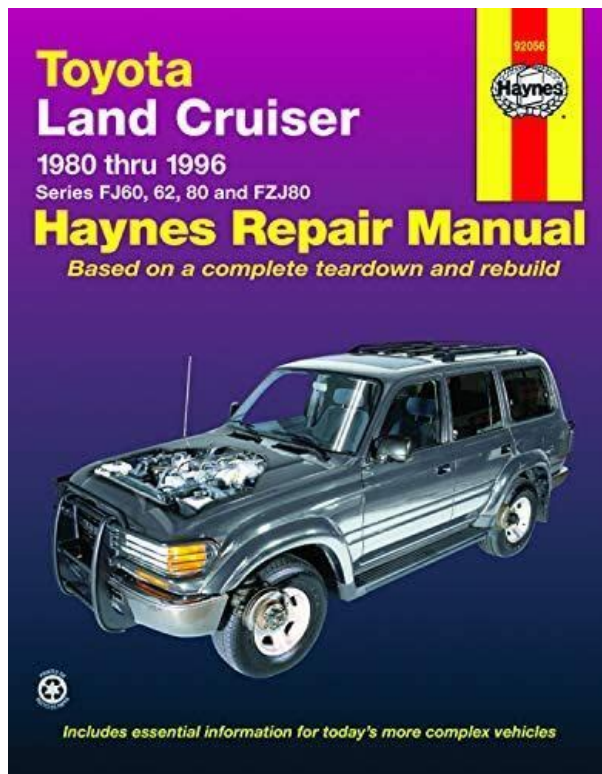

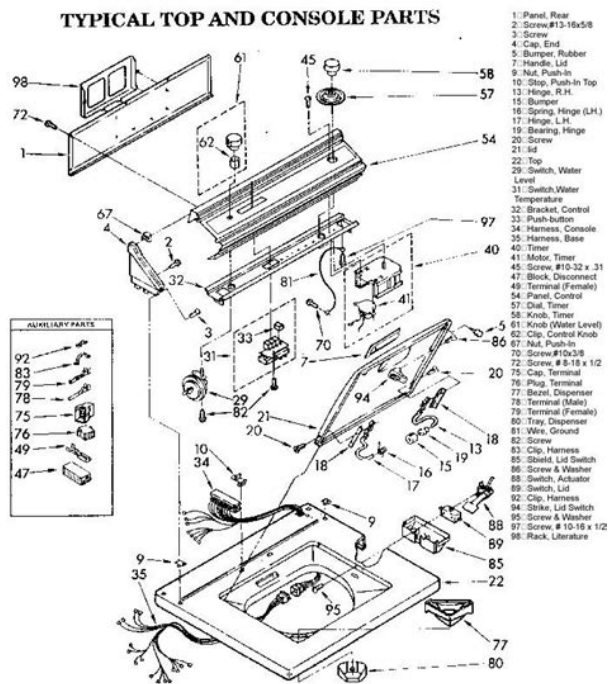

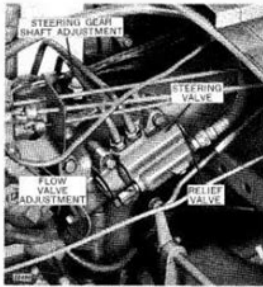


Figure 170-15-1—Steering Adjustments

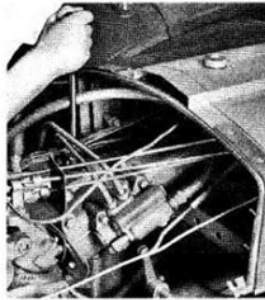


Figure 170-15-2—Adjusting Steering Gear Shaft End Play

### Steering Gear Shaft End Play.

Steering gear shaft end play is adjusted by means of the adjusting screw at the top of the housing (Figure 170-15-2).

To adjust, remove the cap nut, loosen the jam nut, turn the screw down snug against the end of the shaft, then back it up 1/8 turn. Lock with jam nut.

### Unequal Steering Force.

If the tractor steers easier in one direction than it does in the other, it can be due to improper location of the control valve assembly on the housing. To correct, loosen the attaching cap screws

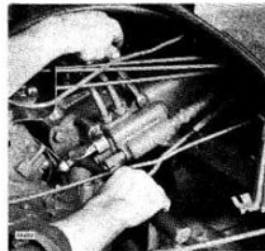


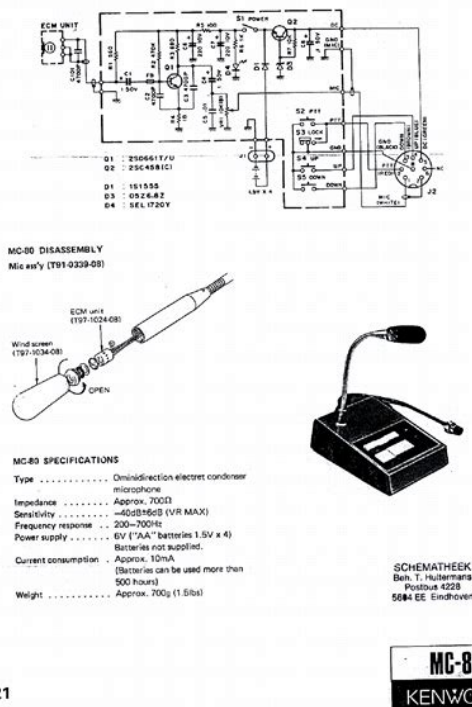
Figure 170-15-3—Centering Steering Valve

Get in there once and fit 2 straight up. I sat them high up to get the cooler air through the intercooler but I doubt there would be any real difference but thought Id do that anyway, draw back is that there is big chunks of IC in the way. I did move the IC forward to fit the trans coolers so plenty of gap. The big bit of work starts in about a weeks time as I have everything to do the job and am taking some time off work. But everything went to plan and there were no dramas. The only disappointment I have is that I had the noise in the manual gearbox that helped to get this conversion under way is still there. Upside is I have a really good auto in the 80 and a good 5 speed and transfer case with everything you need to do a auto to manual conversion. Flywheel and 2 year old OEM clutch and pressure plate clutch pedal and lines etc. I may just be putting all that up for sale. Chasing that tick can cost a lot of dosh but happier that I didnt go down the rebuild path and end up with nothing in return other than a fresher manual. What I really like about it is taking off from a stop, it is foot down and just leave it there until you are at whatever speed you want to be, no pissing around with clutches and levers it is great. Gee it is nice though around town. A mate has a Standard auto 1992 1HDT Sahara and this leaves him for dead. It has yet to get it dirty that will be one test but the main reason for the change was towing and I am yet to test out how it tows the CT but I am pretty confident it will be perfectly fine. Lastly I dont see any reason that early next year I will be getting a Nomad valve body for the transmission. I am a little sentimental for the old manual so I have kept the old knob I also fitted a missile switch to save an accident with the CD Lock since it is PT now also.

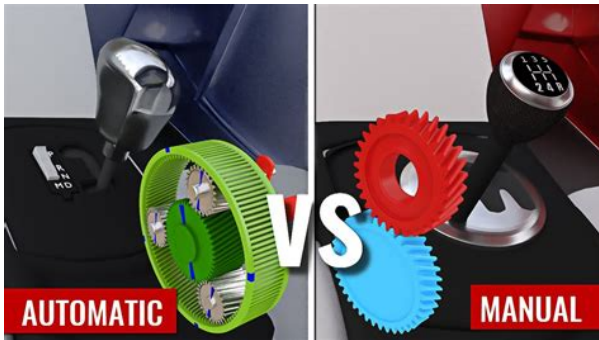

ComfortOriented Models During its introduction in the market in 1950, Toyota Land Cruiser was popular for its offroad capabilities and durability. The company continued to produce the vehicle with this feature until the late 1960s when they decided to also gear towards improving the comfort of the interior. The models back then were very box shaped and clunky when compared to today's designs. We will discuss all the comfortoriented models starting from the latest series down to the oldest. The 200 Series offered many features and upgrades that are not available in the previous series like the aesthetic and cosmetic changes made to the body and interior including Smart Entry — When the remote is near the vehicle, a sensor is triggered prompting the car to open once the user touches the door handle. This is a twinturbocharger version of the previous engine used in the 70 series. There are two different versions of the 100series, the 100 and the 105. The two versions look very similar however, there are notable differences when it comes to the bodywork. The most evident detail is that the front end of the vehicle generally appears lower than the rear on the 100 models due to its IFS. The other noticeable difference is the design of the wheels. The 100 models have relatively flat wheel designs. On the other hand, the 105 models have dished wheels. Regardless of these differences and official model names, both series are known as the 100 series.

Also, the introduction of a V8 engine was a breakthrough and also a first for a Land Cruiser and was specifically intended to boost the sales in the NorthAmerican market, where it was the only engine available. Generally, the 100series has lived up to the expectation of being a durable and reliable vehicle. In this series, comfort and style was being introduced on top of its original and established offroad features thus gaining worldwide attention. It was the only country that produced the vehicles even after production had officially ended in Japan in 1997. However, the Cumana plant located in Venezuela continued to produce these models until 1992 for the local market. The evolution from a reliable heavy duty utility vehicle to an RV Recreational Vehicle, the debut of the 60 series changed

the general concept of 4WD vehicles together with the addition of the luxury GX grade. Its body and interior look absolutely different from its predecessor, the 55 series. The 60series underwent a number of minor mechanical changes between some of the models. In that time, it took on power windows and automatic transmission as well as other luxury trimmings. The 60 series was available in the following solid exterior colours Alpine White, Brown, Desert Beige, Freeborn Red, Royal Blue; and in the following metallic exterior colours Charcoal Gray, Cognac, GrayBlue, Rootbeer, Sky Blue, Stardust Silver. Of all the Land Cruiser models produced from the beginning, 55 was the first to have fully enclosed box frame members. Looking at all Land Cruiser wagons sold in the U.S., including the FJ45, 55 solely is the series that does not have a tailgate and hatch in the rear. Instead, it features a tailgate only that has an electrically operated window that can be retracted into the tailgate. The FJ55 was a 4door station wagon version based on the FJ40s Drivetrain, replacing the 4Door FJ45V I. It had a longer wheelbase and was made to be offered specifically in Australia and North America.

Jan 1975 The F engine was replaced by the 2F engine. The Model 56 is produced in Japan only and it has a 2F engine. Other changes include the addition of a 4door mediumwheelbase model the 76 and an innovative front for all of the models. The 201415 30th Anniversary Series 70 was marketed in Japan as a 4door wagon or 4door pickup with the 1GRFE V6 petrol engine and 5speed manual transmission. Although looking almost similar on the exterior, the 20 and 40series varied significantly on the interior. In addition, defying the eye, the construction of the body was vastly different. The 40 series had greatly widened its range with approximately a quarter of a century of collected technology developments. The J40 series was manufactured with both petrol and diesel engines. The B series has a 4cylinder diesel; the H series has a 6cylinder diesel, while the F series has a 6cylinder petrol motor. The majority of the 40 series of Land Cruisers were made as 2door vehicles. It also had more stylish bodywork and features a better driving comfort because of longer fourplate leaf springs which had been adapted from the Toyota Light Truck. Using a 135 PS 99 kW 3.9 L sixcylinder Type F gasoline engine made it powerful. However, it still only had a threespeed gearbox. They also moved the engine forward making the interior more comfortable. The Bandeirante has a MercedesBenz diesel engine as it replaced the Toyota petrol engine. The FJ25 models were manufactured until August 1968 in Brazil. Production numbers were fairly low; in 1965 the produced cars totalled to less than a thousand. With the increased demand in a military light utility vehicle, Toyota was asked to create a prototype of the thenpopular Jeep. Toyota responded to this challenge thus, giving birth to the Toyota "Jeep" BJ combining a Btype engine with a Jeep model. Because of its brilliant features and performance, BJ, later on, became the official patrol car of National Police Agency.

right amount of power goes to the wheels so it can operate at a given speed. When you take off from a dead stop, your vehicle uses a lower gear ratio to get the car moving using more power and less speed. At higher speeds, your transmission uses a higher gear ratio to move the vehicle while keeping the RPMs at a low level. The driver uses a stick shift to manually change the gears as they accelerate and decelerate their vehicle. Located on the center console, the shift lever is connected to the transmission by a linkage. Engaging the clutch pedal disengages the clutch mechanism that is located between the engine and the transmission. Pressing down on the clutch pedal stops power going from the engine to the transmission so you can change gears. Learning to drive a stick takes some practice.

Engage the clutch pedal too fast and the engine will stall; engage the clutch pedal too slow and it can cause premature wear. Practice makes perfect. Using fluid pressure, the vehicle automatically completes gear changes on its own. The heart of the automatic transmission is the planetary gear set. This part is responsible for creating the different gear ratios that the transmission uses. This fluid not only cools and lubricates the moving parts of the transmission but it helps drive the vehicle. Fluid is used to lock and unlock planetary gears to shift between gear ratios. This shifting happens automatically; the driver doesn't have to do anything. Cars are making more power and using less fuel with the modern day technology that has been crammed into the newschool boxes. It is simply a fluid coupling; the fluid inside the convertor is pushed outwards through internal fins by the spinning engine, which in turn engages the transmission and drives the vehicle. This slip will occur until there is a 1to1 lock with the RPM of the engine. It's basically a giant lowrange gear. As I said before the clutch in a manual performs similarly to the torque convertor in an auto. To take off, a clutch slips until it is engaged. Well, offroad you may regularly need to slip that clutch technical rock driving comes to mind; and when that happens, I'm sure you can see the dollar signs. An auto will slip all day, every day without doing damage. In your manual you would have approached the hill, then when you hit the wheel holes and lost traction and forward movement, you had to use the clutch to stop on the hill then slip the clutch gingerly as you took off trying to maintain traction. Well an auto does that simply by slipping via the torque convertor. Aftermarket kits for the 200 Series and many other vehicles exist that will lock up first gear and use engine braking to the point of stalling your vehicle.
